Juneau, Alaska, US

Tuesday, July 29, 2025

Located at the foot of grand mountain peaks on the Gastineau Channel, the town of Juneau has the massive Mendenhall Glacier and the immense Juneau Icefields at its back door. Juneau is the place to let your imagination run wild. Explore the lush Tongass National Forest. Visit the rustic shops in town. Or get out and kayak, dogsled, raft, hike, whale watch, flightsee or fish. There's no end to the adventure because of the long daylight hours. Climb aboard the Mt. Roberts Tramway for a great spot to hike and shoot a souvenir photo.

ALASKA SALMON BAKE



Duration: Approximately 1½ hours Departs at 1:00 pm; 6:30 pm Price: Adult \$79.95

This excursion has been grilled to perfection for nearly 40 years. Listen to Alaska-style folk music while you dine under translucent, heated domes shielding you from the elements.

Enjoy an **all-you-can-eat salmon bake feast**. Savor Alaskan-caught wild salmon barbecued over an open alderwood fire served with a tasty secret sauce. The salmon is accompanied by barbecue ribs, cheesy au gratin potatoes, baked beans with reindeer sausage, wild rice pilaf, a variety of salads, cornbread, lemonade, coffee, tea, hot apple cider, hot chocolate, and blueberry cake for dessert. Beer, wine and soda are available for purchase.



Stroll through the woods and **roast marshmallows over the campfire** after your meal.

Take the short **walk** along Salmon Creek -- a salmon spawning stream -- to a waterfall where you can also explore the remains of the historic Wagner Mine and try your hand at **gold panning** . Shuttle buses run regularly; return to the pier at your leisure.

ALASKA'S WHALES & MENDENHALL GLACIER TRAIL (A SMALL-GROUP TOUR)



Duration: Approximately 5 hours Departs at 3:30 pm; 4:15 pm Price: Adult \$259.95

View Alaska's humpback whales and the Mendenhall Glacier on a small-group excursion (capacity is limited to 20 travelers) tailored for sensational encounters with nature. On a custom-built safari vessel, you'll seek out marine wildlife and step away from the crowds on a secluded rain forest trail -- two pristine habitats

to explore on a single tour. On this trip, you will learn about the interdependence of species and the many connections between the land and sea. This exploration introduces you to this pristine wilderness in an intimate setting with a certified naturalist guide as your leader.

Your trip begins with your guide sharing stories and perspectives as you travel to **Mendenhall Glacier**. A short, **guided hike** gives you exclusive access along a **wooded path**, once completely covered by the massive glacier. Spend an hour exploring amid forested moraines and sweeping glacial landscapes, track the glacier's recession over the past 100 years, and perhaps glimpse wildlife from the Steep Creek viewing platforms. This small corner of the **Tongass National Forest** is home to beavers, salmon, Arctic terns, porcupines and even black bears.

Following a short drive, you'll climb aboard a covered, heated **safari vessel**. This specialized watercraft has large, opening panel windows and an open bow and stern for viewing the wildlife that thrives in these protected waters. Humpback whales, orcas, sea lions, porpoises, seals and sea birds are commonly seen. Stephens Passage is a renowned whale watching and wildlife refuge, and your experienced Coast Guard-certified captain will guide you to the action. Keep your camera handy as you travel from place to place or drift quietly to witness the behaviors and antics of the area's notable marine residents. This tour is locally owned and operated.

Notes:

The operator of this tour **guarantees that a whale will be sighted** on this excursion from May 15th through September 15th, with participants receiving a \$100 cash refund from the tour operator after the tour if a whale is not sighted. A guarantee is not offered outside of these dates; however, the tour operator's whalesighting remains highly likely. Other wildlife sightings are likely but are not guaranteed. The small group size of this tour ensures a personalized and interactive atmosphere, making the most of your one-of-a-kind Alaska experience. Participants must be able to walk approximately one mile on level, improved gravel trails. Rain ponchos on the trail and binoculars on the boat are available for use. Water and a snack are provided. ALPINE MEADOW TRAIL SEGWAY RIDE

Embark on a sightseeing tour as unusual as your destination -- by Segway. Far away from traffic

and crowds, explore a scenic alpine meadow trail by eco-friendly transport.

A 20-minute van ride transports you to picturesque Fish Creek Valley at Eaglecrest, Juneau's wintertime ski resort. A short training session will help acquaint you with your **Segway** X2 before gearing up and heading out on a **Nordic ski trail**, gliding through serene alpine meadows in the shadow of snow-capped peaks.

The Segway's fat tires are ideally suited for the groomed gravel trail and provide a cushioned ride. Your guide will provide interesting facts about the flora and fauna endemic to Alaska.

Several short stops will be made along the way for **photos** and to stretch your legs. The halfway point is beautiful Fish Creek and its crystal clear, snow-melt waters.

Enjoy a **light snack** before the Segway ride back to base camp.

Following your Segway adventure, return to the pier.

Minimum age is 14 years. Maximum age is 70 years. Minimum height is 4'0". Minimum weight is 100 lbs. Maximum weight is 250 lbs. BIKE & BREW GLACIER VIEW

This value-priced excursion offers three experiences in one -- biking, seeing Mendenhall Glacier, and tasting Alaska microbrewery beers. It's a chance to experience the beauty surrounding Juneau at a slower pace with a friendly, knowledgeable local guide.

On the **van ride** to the bike departure point, you will hear about Juneau's history and some interesting information about the city and its surroundings.

Gear up with a **bike and helmet**, and listen to a safety briefing. You'll set out from the east side of the Mendenhall Glacier. Bike past a beautiful view of the glacier, over a beaver dam, and across the **Mendenhall River** bridge.

Continue via the Juneau road system and bike path to the west side of **Mendenhall Glacier** for a **beach stop**. On the east side of Mendenhall Glacier, you will ride along a one-mile trail through the **rainforest**.

Next, travel by van to **Merchants Wharf** -- an old seaplane hangar in downtown Juneau and a landmark in aviation history. Here, you will **taste award-winning beers** from microbreweries around Alaska.

Notes:

The ride covers approximately eight miles. Terrain is a mostly flat road with some rolling

hills. Minimum height is 56 inches. Minimum age is 10 years. Minimum age to participate in the beer tasting is 21 years, with photo ID. Guests who are pregnant may participate during the first trimester only. Waiver must be signed and medical conditions disclosed.

DISCOVER ALASKA'S WHALES (A SMALL-GROUP TOUR)



Duration: Approximately 3³/₄ hours Departs at 3:30 pm; 5:45 pm Price: Adult \$229.95

What a great way to put into practice your personal travel ethos and leave the beautiful State of Alaska even better than you found it!

This small-group outing (maximum 20 privileged guests) will travel aboard a fully-permitted research vessel for a closer look into the habitat of humpback whales. The boat has a heated cabin, a low-to-the-water build, large opening panel windows, and an open bow and stern -features specifically designed to meet the challenges of observing wildlife here in Alaska.

As you head out from the quaint harbor at Auke Bay, your guide will share the current understanding of humpback whale research and what is known about activities and feeding patterns here in Alaska. A whale sighting is guaranteed in peak season, and you're also likely to see seals, porpoise, sea lions and other marine animals, all while doing some significant good as you contribute to a whale research program.

You'll explore the foundation of the food chain by looking at live sea animals in a touch tank, and using a GPS camera to identify whale species while recording their various behaviors. You will also have the satisfaction of being a marine scientist for a day and knowing your efforts have contributed to understanding the delicate marine environs of Southeast Alaska and the whales' interaction with their habitat. Water and a **snack** are provided.

Notes:

All activities on this tour are operated by permit and regulation through the ADFG and NOAA in support of the University of Alaska and the Alaska Sea Grant Marine Advisory Program. The operator of this tour guarantees that a whale **will be sighted** on this excursion from May 15th through September 15th, with participants receiving a \$100 cash refund from the tour operator after the tour if a whale is not sighted. A guarantee is not offered outside of these dates; however, a whale sighting remains highly likely. The small group size of this tour ensures a personal and interactive atmosphere making the most of this authentic Alaska experience. DOG SLED SUMMER CAMP

Learn what it takes to be a musher in the great lditarod dog sled race with a trip to a **dog sled camp**.

Your adventure begins as you embark on a van ride into the remote and scenic **Sheep Creek Valley**. You're headed to the home of some of the state's foremost athletes.

Upon arrival, you will be greeted by an experienced professional musher and their dog team. You'll tour the camp, visit the **replica Iditarod race checkpoint**, and go through the steps the mushers perform, as if you're traveling the route with them.

Climb aboard a comfortable **wheeled sled** (no snow) and relax as a sled dog team whisks you along the 1.5-mile trail through the beautiful landscape.

Returning to camp, visit with the dogs, pet the puppies, and learn what it's like to live amid 120 happy sled dogs.

Notes:

Tour requires walking a maximum of 50 yards. Dress warmly in layers with a windproof and waterproof outer layer. Wear sturdy non-skid walking shoes. Professional photographs are available for purchase. The transportation is not wheelchair-accessible and wheelchairs/scooters cannot be accommodated on the transportation. (Dis)embarking the vehicle includes a 12-inch step. Animals of any kind, including service animals, are not allowed on tour.

DOG SLEDDING & GLACIER ADVENTURE BY HELICOPTER

This genuinely Alaskan adventure offers the rare opportunity to **mush your dog sled team** across a **snow-covered glacier**.

Helicopter to an exclusive **dog sled camp** located on the picturesque middle branch of the **Norris Glacier**. On your way there, you will be amazed by a beautiful heli-flightseeing trip over the vast **Juneau Icefield**. Watch for the largest glacier on the Icefield -- the advancing Taku Glacier. View spectacular icefalls, rock formations, and untamed wilderness. Accessible only by air, this region is filled with lush forests, glassy alpine lakes, jagged mountain peaks, and awe-inspiring glaciers.

From here on, it all goes to the dogs. You'll land at the dog-sledding base on the glacier and learn the tricks of the trade from seasoned veterans of the legendary Iditarod Race. Master the all-important commands of Hike! Gee! and Haw! Then, armed with your new vocabulary, experience the thrill of zipping across a pristine glacier pulled by a team of friendly Alaskan sled dogs. There may be no better way to enjoy the fresh mountain air and scenic vistas.

Enjoy approximately 30 to 35 minutes of **helicopter** time and one hour at the dog base.

A veteran dog sled musher will lead you on your sled adventure. Overboots are provided for glacier landings. Minimum age is 2 years. Guests weighing 250 lbs or more (fully clothed) pay an additional surcharge over the published fare. Guests' weights will be verified during check-in. The tour operator will endeavor to be discreet during this process, but please be aware that individual circumstances may not allow for

complete privacy. Seating is determined by the weight and balance of the aircraft. The tour operator will do their best to keep groups together, but groups may be separated. Not advisable for guests using a wheelchair. Tour operates subject to meeting a minimum number of participants. This tour can be cancelled without penalty on the day your voyage commences. FIVE GLACIER SEAPLANE EXPLORATION

The grandeur of Alaska's epic glaciers will thrill and delight you on Juneau's only five-glacier

flightseeing tour. Seeing glaciers from the air is an Alaskan must-do, and doing so by authentic Alaskan seaplane (also known as a **floatplane**) is the quintessential Alaskan experience. One of Alaska's most important modes of transportation is the seaplane, allowing you to escape into the true Alaskan wilderness within minutes of leaving the ship.

Your seaplane exploration begins as your aircraft gently takes off from the historical downtown Juneau waterfront, carrying you over the remnants of Juneau's mining past.

You will soar over the lush wilderness of the Tongass National Forest to catch your first glimpse of five distinctly different, absolutely majestic glaciers making up a section of the 1,500-square-mile Juneau Ice Field. Glide over the deep crevasses and azure blue meltwater pools of the Norris, Hole-In-The-Wall, East and West Twin Glaciers, plus the famous five-milewide Taku Glacier. Of the 36 named glaciers comprising the Juneau Ice Field, the Taku Glacier is the largest.

Notes:

This tour can be cancelled without penalty on the day your voyage commences. Cancellations thereafter are non-refundable. Maximum weight is 300 lbs. All participants enjoy a window seat for enhanced viewing and a headset for continuous narration. Narration is in English but can be provided in writing in Mandarin, Spanish, Catalan, German, Japanese, Dutch, Portuguese, Italian and French.

GLACIER VIEW SEA KAYAKING



Duration: Approximately 3½ hours Departs at 2:00 pm Price: Adult \$154.95 Travel in the style of Native Alaskans and explore the spectacular **coastal waterways and Mendenhall wetlands** by **kayak**. Never paddled before? No worries! Your experienced guide will make sure you are comfortable.

This glorious half-day excursion along Juneau's coast begins with a short drive by bus to **North Douglas Island**, where you will enjoy scenic views of Mendenhall Glacier.

An experienced, friendly guide will hand out life jackets and rain gear before teaching you some paddling techniques. Then, hop into a twoperson **kayak** with a new friend or traveling companion. This breathtaking trip is designed to give you a sense of how the Aleut Natives traveled the coastal waterways of Alaska in search of pelts for the Russian fur trading companies. Your stable yet nimble kayak will allow you to silently observe any wildlife in the area, including porpoise, seals, sea lions, eagles, herons, or even whales.

Explore the **Mendenhall Wetlands**, where you can view the spectacular Mendenhall Glacier from an ocean explorer's point of view. This view of the glacier is from about six miles away, so (weather/cloud conditions permitting) you'll see how the massive river of ice winds up through the mountain peaks for miles -- truly one of the best views of Mendenhall Glacier.

Along the way, your guide will entertain you with stories about Smugglers Cove and the surrounding area's history and point out any local flora and fauna. This kayak trip is perfect for all levels of experience -- participants are grouped into like abilities so that you can travel at a comfortable pace. The tail-end boat captain will ensure that your experience is fun.

Back at the kayak base, enjoy a snack and receive a souvenir pin before the bus journey

back to port.

Notes:

Minimum weight is 40 lbs.; kayak cockpit is 10.5" X 16.5". Guests weighing more than 250 lbs may not fit comfortably in the kayak. Guests taller than 6'3" will not be able to steer with foot pedals and must sit in front. Waiver must be signed and medical conditions disclosed.

guides you past curious seals resting on floating icebergs. You'll make many stops, and you'll have incredible opportunities to view and photograph the glacier, hundreds of icebergs or bergy bits, sheer cliffs, and wildlife.

Enjoy a light **snack** of puff pastry and smoked salmon, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate.

The **caravan of karts** sets off to explore the remote backcountry along several miles of improved forest trail with your guide in the lead ATV. Feel the adrenaline rush at the start of your journey in a **Polaris RZR 1000** that tests your ability to traverse the wilderness. A comfortable pace is maintained as you thread your way around steep curves. The road climbs to reveal unparalleled views of the Tongass National Forest, Behm Canal and Alaska's fabled Inside Passage.

Drivers and passengers have the opportunity to switch positions for the return trip. Watch for wildlife along the way -- eagles, deer or bears are frequently sighted.

Shopping opportunities await you in the General Store before the scenic drive back to the ship.

You'll work as a group to bring fish aboard and provide for the gourmet wilderness meal you're about to enjoy.

At a wilderness campsite, a **crackling fire** awaits. You'll settle into the stillness of the rainforest, rest on a beach log, and breathe deeply among centuries-old spruce trees and fragrant cedars. A **wilderness dining** chef celebrates the group's catch with a meal featuring the fish you just caught. Neets Bay is a pristine wilderness area limited to a small number of visitors annually. The splendor of the Tongass National Forest is breathtaking, offering numerous photo opportunities. Watch for whales, eagles and sea lions en route.

Southeast Alaska is home to thousands of **black bears**, who stake their claim near salmonspawning streams. Near the base of such a stream, learn about the habitat you're about to explore and the bears you'll observe. Enjoy the serenity of the lush forest and a chance to spot smaller woodland creatures from the wellmaintained **forest trail** as you walk through the forest towards the stream.

Questions? Great! Your guide has all the answers about these majestic ursine mammals and will gladly share that knowledge. Breathtaking photo ops document your coexistence with these incredible creatures in their own habitat. You may even see the bears teaching their young to fish or relaxing after a meal of fresh pink salmon. Nothing compares to being near these beautiful creatures in the wild.

An elevated **boardwalk trail** leads you to private viewing platforms overlooking Eagle Creek, where bears often come to fish for salmon in the stream. The nearby Whitman Hatchery ensures the river is teeming with salmon every summer. Typically, large numbers of black bears gather here to feed on these enormous runs of salmon returning to spawn in the stream. Bald eagles perch in the trees, waiting patiently for scraps left by the bears. Mink and marten often frequent the area, and seals often hang out near the mouth of the stream, feeding on the bountiful fish runs. You will have ample time to observe the wildlife activity.

Walk through the historic Herring Bay Lumber Company sawmill established by legendary

pioneer Ben Fleenor. Visit the carving center and explore the large collection of **Tsimshian totems** in the courtyard.

Transportation to and from the sanctuary is by bus.

Bears have an acute sense of smell; do not wear strong scents or bring food of any kind. Pets and service animals are not allowed on tour. Hear stories of life in a small Alaskan community. Footage from an underwater drone gives you a feel for the ecosystem surrounding the oyster rafts and the oysters' food sources.

Lead with your taste buds at the on-site **floating Oyster Bar**, where you will sample freshlyharvested oyster and kelp products in a true ocean-to-table experience.

Browse in the **gift shop** before returning to the ship by boat and van.

Follow the lead guide caravan style as you **steer yourself** on a route tailored to the day's conditions. This region has mountainous terrain, lush forest, and pristine scenery.

Your guide will share the rich stories of the loggers from the timber years and the nearby fishing camps. View Escape Point, where Captain George Vancouver and the Native Americans once skirmished, and Traitor's Cove.

Head north over Neets Bay Salmon Hatchery -a popular bear-viewing site -- and past glaciercarved canals, pristine mountain peaks, and siltladen aqua waters. See Helm Bay, a former gold mine site, cascading waterfalls, jewel-like lakes, spruce, hemlock, cedar forests, and snowcapped peaks.

Guests weighing 250 lbs or more (fully clothed) will be assessed a weight surcharge of \$168. The surcharge is paid directly to the tour operator just prior to the flight. Trolling involves using a downrigger to lower the bait to a specific depth. There are four downriggers, so up to four rods may be fished at once, allowing for fishing at different depths. Fishermen are rotated (instead of assigning rods) so that everyone has a fair chance to catch a fish. The captain may elect to use only two rods if the fish are plentiful. A light snack is provided. At Herring Cove, an all-terrain custom 4x4 Unimog will transport you up a steep rain forest hillside to the canopy chalet. Professionally trained guides will outfit you with state-of-theart safety equipment and provide a detailed orientation before you mount the first platform.

Your rain forest canopy challenge features a 'flight' over nine **zip-lines**. Your guide will progressively ease you into the forest canopy along cables ranging from 100 feet to the 600foot and as high as 100 feet above the ground. Eagles and bears are often seen from the platforms. Cross three hanging bridges offering breathtaking views of the virgin forest below. You will be up to 135 feet above the forest floor. Throughout this adventure, you are surrounded by the sights and sounds of the rain forest wildlife preserve. The final zip-line emerges from the rain forest and transports you over lush grassy wetlands to a viewing tower 55 feet above where you will gently descend to the forest floor.

Time permitting, explore the totem park and a historic sawmill, and watch a blacksmith at work. Stop by the General Store to see photos taken during your zip-line experience and to shop for mementos of your Alaska adventure.

Your excursion concludes with a scenic drive back to the ship.

Join this memorable trip into the **Tongass Rain Forest** to the Tatoosh Islands. You'll paddle with Ketchikan's most experienced local sea kayaking company, among magnificent scenery and wildlife sighting opportunities.

Take a 25-minute **van** ride; then, a fast and fun **boat ride** brings you to a world of ancient cedars, spruce and western hemlock trees.

At the remote and protected **Tatoosh Islands**, your guides greet you and present a quick but thorough orientation. Get into your double **kayak** and begin with some practice strokes as you approach the sheltered islands. Surrender to the peacefulness of the setting as you glide along the wild rocky shoreline.

Bald eagles peer down from overhead, while seals often pop up to take a peek. The intertidal zone includes mink, river otter, orange and purple starfish, red and white jellyfish, mussels and seaweeds. Further out in the floating bull kelp, watch for harbor seals, who watch back with a shy and curious disposition. Keep an eye out for humpback whales, sea lions and orcas. Black bears and wolves have been sighted here as well.



This wonderful whale watching and marine wildlife cruise invites you to experience BC's enchanting wildlife. It is carbon neutral and led by certified and trained marine naturalists whose passion and knowledge of Vancouver Island marine wildlife expands your own understanding and offers memories to last a lifetime.

With a greater than 95% success rate of spotting whales between April and October, you're likely to encounter Bigg's killer whales (transient orca), humpback, minke, and gray whales. Keep an eye out also for Steller and California sea lions, sea otters, harbor porpoises, and many different types of seabird, including cormorants and bald eagles. This covered-vessel tour offers a heated indoor cabin, outdoor viewing decks providing a bird'seye view of the wildlife, marine naturalist guides, an on-board restroom, hot beverages included, and snacks available for purchase. Check out the gift shop on board for a memento.
